An incisional hernia happens when a weakness in the muscle of the abdomen allows the tissues of the abdomen to protrude through the muscle. The hernia appears as a bulge under the skin and can be painful or tender to the touch. The weakness in the muscle is caused by the incision made in a prior abdominal surgery. An incisional hernia is a type of hernia caused by an incompletely healed surgical wound. A hernia is a bulge or protrusion of body tissue or an organ through the structure that normally contains it. A hernia usually occurs when an organ or fatty tissue pushes itself through a weak spot in a surrounding area.

An Incisional Hernia is a hernia that occurs through a previously made incision in the abdominal wall, ie the scar left from a previous surgical operation. The incision will have been made in order to get to an internal organ such as the appendix, or a caesarian section. So an Incisional hernia is not the same as a Recurrent Hernia.

Incisional hernias result from a weakening of the abdominal muscle due to a surgical incision.

Spigelian hernia: The intestine pushes through the abdomen at the side of the abdominal muscle, below the navel. Diaphragmatic hernia: Organs in the abdomen move into the chest through an opening in the diaphragm. How common are hernias? Of all hernias that occur: 75 to 80% are inguinal or femoral. 2% are incisional or ventral.

Incisional hernias can occur at any surgical incision site on the abdominal wall. They can occur soon after an operation or may develop months or years later. Incisional hernias are quite common and

when small may go unnoticed. If incisional hernias are left untreated they will get larger with time.

An Incisional hernia is a type of hernia that can occur at the site of an incision for a previous surgery. It is different from a ventral hernia, which occurs at the same natural weakening in the abdominal wall. Incisional hernias typically get larger over time. These hernias must be repaired to eliminate the risk of dangerous strangulation.

Inguinal hernia — A portion of intestine or internal fat protrudes through a weakness in the inguinal canal. The inguinal canal is a natural passageway through the abdominal wall in the groin. In males, the inguinal canal contains the blood vessels that go to the testicle and the duct that carries sperm from the testicle.

Incisional hernia is generally observed in those individuals who undergo any abdominal surgery. Incisional hernia usually is caused when the intestines try to press their way out through the incision scar of surgery or even the tissues close to scar, which are under the process of recovery from surgery.

An incisional hernia is a type of hernia caused by an incompletely-healed surgical wound. Since median incisions in the abdomen are frequent for abdominal exploratory surgery, ventral incisional hernias are often also classified as ventral hernias due to their location. Not all ventral hernias are from incisions, as some may be caused by other trauma or congenital problems.
